BAPAC continues to organize and lead various civil, charitable, and entrepreneurial programs in Banglatown in 2017.

1. Enrollment for Medicaid Extension under the Affordable Care Act is being held at BAPAC office every Saturday through its certified navigator. As of June 2017, over 670 applicants have been enrolled.



2. Since April 1, 2017, the ESL (English as Second Language) class is being held at BAPAC office every Saturday exclusively for the women of Banglatown.



3. On April 19, 2017 BAPAC partnered with Detroit Mercy, School of Architecture department to conduct an urban design project called Detroit Design City: Banglatown. Three groups of students presented their final projects to City officials and Community Leaders.

6. On May 2, 2017 a twelve-member group of German Delegation Leaders from various social, political, private and government organizations visited Banglatown as part of the Welcoming America program





7. On on May 13, 2017, BAPAC partnered with City of Detroit to host a Pop UP enrollment site for Detroit Municipal ID program for all Detroiters regardless of their immigration status 8. On June 20, 2017, BAPAC particiapted in the "Detroit Neighborhood Retail Opportunity Study workshops" that idetified Conant Avenue (from Davision to Holbrrok) in Banglatown as one of most poromising retail business locations in City of Detroit.
